Letting the Holy Spirit Guide Us.

On Sunday, April 7, nearly fifty people gathered in Lincoln Hall for pizza, salad, and other goodies. As we prayed and shared memories about Jane Hartwell's amazing legacy and her incredible gift to Trinity, a sense of deep gratitude filled the room. Added to that, children zipped around on scooters and teens whispered ideas about what the future could hold. A sense of energy filled the room. We had gathered, people from many different generations with long connections and recent connections to Trinity, to dream new dreams for Christian ministry in this place.

Peter's Ponderings continued

Over the course of the next hour and 15 minutes, conversations were held at the seven different tables in the room about what a thriving and flourishing church would look like. Together we shared these dreams with each other. It was a holy time of letting God's Holy Spirit work in and through us, bringing up ideas for new ministries, new ways of being, and new ways of nourishing faith, hope, and formation in our midst. Children's laughter filled the air, and creative ideas filled our minds.

As the priest at Trinity, this first *Dreaming for the Future* session was a deeply holy event for which I am profoundly thankful. It fills me with anticipation for the next two events which will be taking place near the end of April where more folks from Trinity will be able to share their hopes and dreams and where the Holy Spirit will guide us as we discern what the future might hold.

There is no better time for us to be doing this work than in the season of Easter which leads into Pentecost. This is the time of year when new life is springing forth, when God is doing something new and bringing forth hope and resurrection all around us. These sessions are a way for us to witness to this hope and this corner stone of the Christian faith.

Similarly, they are a way for us to anticipate the power of Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit, God's very presence in us, who is seeking to guide us into the future of ministry and communal life which God desires for us.

Each and every voice which is present at these meetings is INVALUABLE. Each dream which is shared is a dream which the Holy Spirit will use the help us learn, grow and discern what path we should take.

This process of discovering what God is calling us to do in the months and years to come as we act as wise stewards of this gift will not be quick. It will take processes such as these — processes where we pray, listen, dream, and let the Holy Spirit lead us and guide us. But if we do this Holy work, I am certain that God will do something far greater, far more wonderful than we would have come up with on our own in a quick period of time.

The Vestry and I are committed to this process of listening to you and to the voice of the Spirit in the days and months to come. We are similarly committed to sharing what we learn and hear so that together we might faithfully follow in the way God leads.

Vestry Meeting held Tuesday, April 23

As always, the meeting opened with a prayer and Peter followed up with a reading of the 23rd Psalm. Busy meeting!

The Rector's report included a review of goings on at church in the last month, which included Holy Week and Easter and all the attendant services There were a number of pastoral concerns which Peter addressed. He spoke about a number of programs and their progress. Service Corps had 18 participants this past weekend. Later in the meeting, we spoke of the fact that a coordinator has been identified to take on all the management details for Service Corps, a job Peter has been doing himself. There are a number of churches involved with Service Corps so the communication and follow-up is a timeconsuming task, better held by one individual whose job it is to do such micro-managing.

Our Jr. Warden, Bill Gordan, spoke on a number of issues. Clean-up day brought out a number of volunteers for which Bill was grateful. Bill spoke of the rot that is in the stained glass windowsills in the church. We have hired someone who will be looking into one window in particular in order to get an in-depth idea of what will be needed to correct the situation in all the windows. You will see a notice elsewhere in this issue that in early May, a stone mason will be working on all the outside stonework to seal up areas

where moisture is getting into the church.

Bill spoke a bit about plans to renovate Trinity Park and the hoops that must be jumped through, people to contact, approval to be sought. He also addressed the discussion later in the meeting on the several bids we have received to redo the roof at Trinity. Our resident engineer and vestry member, Polly Sewall will be looking carefully at one of the bids and then a decision will be made what bid to accept.

Our treasurer, Bill Spear provided a monthly report as well as actuals v.s. Budget numbers and a balance sheet. There was discussion about Trinity's audit and pulling together an audit team that does not include those who presently work with our finances.

An Endowment Committee was discussed, as well as the need for Sunday coordinators to make sure everyone serving is present was stressed...does not need to be a vestry person! The Dreaming Sessions and some of the great ideas given at the first session were discussed. These are the meetings asking for parish ideas of how best to use the legacy given to Trinity by Jane Hartwell and what our dreams are for trinity in general.

The Yard Sale is coming in early June. See article in this issue. A special outreach to the children from the Day School has been suggested as a summer event, with our Sunday School liaison Rory Nickerson leading a craft day.

So much happens at a vestry meeting and you are always welcome to come and learn more about how our church is run and decisions made. More information on matters discussed are found in THIS Herald.! So read on!

Pentecost at Trinity

On Sunday, May 19, Trinity will be celebrating the Feast of the Pentecost; the day when the church commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit upon God's faithful who make up the church. As part of this celebratory service you are encouraged to wear RED, which is the festive color of the day. Additionally, our first lesson from the Book of Acts will be read in multiple languages at the same time.

Why would we do this? The story we recount on Pentecost is of God speaking to all people in languages they can understand. God, breaking out beyond just one culture and entering in to the diversity of the human family. It's true that on most Sundays at Trinity we stick to just English as part of our worship. That said, God's family is far broader than our monolingual worship. And Pentecost is a good day for us to hear French, Spanish, Latin, Lingala, and all kinds of other languages in our common worship to remind us just how broad and wide the reign of God really is.

So, if you might be willing to dust off your foreign language skills on Sunday, May 19, we'd love to have you take part that day. You can sign up on the bulletin board for one of these readings.



Vestry Moves Ahead with Repointing Stonework on Trinity.

At the March Vestry Meeting, Vestry voted to move ahead with repointing and repairing the stonework on the outside of the church this spring. Much of the grout holding our stonework together has seriously degraded and is no longer keeping water out of the building. All of the stonework facing Trinity Park, the entrance facing Forest Avenue, and all of the stonework facing Coyle Street will be redone.

At the 10 o'clock service on Easter, Peter did a Children's Sermon at one point in the service, a brief but happy time with the children gathered around. As a surprise for the children, Peter gave them little containers which, when opened, exploded with brilliant, Easter-colored indescent confetti!

The children were thrilled, and looked for any leftover handouts. PENTECOST TRIVIA

Pentecost is a Christian holiday which takes place on the 50th day after Easter Sunday. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Mary, mother of Jesus, and the Apostles of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, as described in the Acts of the Apostles. The story goes that the disciples heard the sound of wind and fire and were filled with the Holy Spirit. We are asked to wear RED on Pentecost Sunday to symbolize the fiery tongues of the Holy Spirit that first descended on the followers. The day was called 'Whitsunday' when I was growing up in the church. Britain still uses the term. — editor
